Double header blue marlin and snow geese????

I must be crazy, back in the states just for a couple of days and off on a wild goose chase...literally.

Capt. Greg and Capt. Lee talked me into a snow goose hunt in Currituck County. I exceeded their expectations and did not freeze to death after spending 6 weeks in the tropics. Those little handwarmers that you shake are incredible, one in every pocket.

We were hunting with some real pros who do it right, Watson Stewart and his son Hunter. Hopefully we will be doing some booking for them next year.

Although the birds didn't fly too well, we managed to pass shoot at the edge of a flock of about 5000 birds, killing 3 of them. We later hunted over decoys and had a bunch of 5 come to the spread, killing all of them. Later in the morning we had 4 at the edge of the spread, one of them neck-banded. Of course we were all shooting at the same bird and we killed the one behind it deader than a hammer. It just goes to show that when the wind is blowing 25 mph, double your lead.

Meanwhile in Costa Rica, the last report that I got was from Del Taylor's group. Marvin is still beating up on Danny pretty bad. I think that Danny is saving up for the tourney this coming week.

The Bite caught a double header on blue marlin and a dozen sails.

The Spanish Fly mixed up the inshore and offshore, catching a rooster and a jack on the inshore side. Fishing offshore they caught 6 sails and a 40 pound wahoo.

Back in the states, Del Taylor report

I'm back in the states for a couple of weeks, but still have a few groups in Costa Rica.

Although the sailfishing is a little off, there is some really good marlin fishing. David on the Bob Cat fought a 500 pound for several hours, getting the leader a bunch, but not getting a chance to touch it.

Here's the report form Del Taylor and his two boat trip:

Thursday:

The Bite: 7 sails, 1 huge striped marlin, 2 dolphin (1 over 60 pounds) and 3 yellowfin. It sounds like Marvin found a school of spinner dolphins.

The Spanish Fly: 3 sails

Friday:

The Bite 2 blue marlin over 250 pounds, 5 sailfish

The Spanish Fly: 5 sailfish

Also an unconfirmed report from Quepos of a boat raising 30 billfish. Sounds like another wave is moving up from the south.

Enclosed is a pic that I took last week, pretty cool. I'm heading back to Costa Rica on March 12. I'll be at the NC Sportsman fishing school on March 11.

Tuesday, February 21, 2006

Inshore/offshore report for 2/21

Raiford Trask Sr.'s Group fished with Daniel on the Spanish Fly today, they started out looking for the sardines and the roosterfish. They found both, landing 19 roosterfish by noon, then they headed offshore for the sails. Unfortunately, the offshore bite started early and was over by noon.

I was on The Bite with Jim and Scott Gray. (Jim is one of the owners of the Hotel Cocal). The sailfish bite has been a little slow, so we headed off of Cabo Blanco, looking for marlin. Before we got all 4 teasers in the water, we had a 200 pound blue marlin in the baits. Scott made quick work of him, releasing his first billfish within 15 minutes of putting the lines in the water.

We made a second attempt at getting all of the lines in the water. As soon as things got straightened out, we had a bite on the shotgun sailfish rod. The fish didn't immediately jump, indicating another possible marlin bite. Sure enough, another blue marlin, this time a little guy, just over 100 pounds.

We got a great look at the fish jumping around the boat and on the leader, identifying it as a small blue marlin and not a striped marlin. It was a tough call, because the stripe would have given us a great shot at a grand slam. Throughout the morning we landed 7 more sailfish.

Highlights....

Although we seem to be in a bit of a slump, the sailfish average has dropped to about 5/day, there have been some notable catches. I'm going to try and post some pics, but it's like trying to cram a basketball down a garden hose.

This is the first wahoo caught on The Bite. Scott Harris Group fished 2 days and landed 16 sails a couple of dolphin and this nice wahoo. There seem to be a lot of wahoo and marlin this year. The wahoo have been a little frustrating, we're pulling circle hooks on mono, so you get a lot more bite-offs than connections. The marlin bite has been good, another grand slam was caught today.

Wilbur Vitols Group just finished up a 2 day trip on the Dream Catcher, they landed 6 sails in two days. We arranged for them to fish on The Bite on the third day, hoping that they would raise a few more fish. Unfortunately, it was a "sancocho" day, and they only landed 3 more sails.

Congrats to Pete Hansen on his first sailfish on the fly, hopefully I will follow with a pic. He was a quick learner, he missed one, came disconnected on the second and landed a big sail on his third attempt. Actually, Pete says that he didn't catch the fish, but the fish caught him.

The Bite 5 sailfish, 1 striped marlin

The Dream 1 2 sailfish, 1 blue marlin

The Dream Catcher 3 sailfish.

All of the boats had marlin in the baits today. All in all, not bad fishing, but a little slow for this time of year.

Monday, February 13, 2006

Full moon blues.....marlin that is.

As often happens on the full moon, the bite has been on and off. The marlin bite has been really good up north.

Seems like the big sailfish bite is either in the morning or the afternoon, we seem to make it there about half the time. Over the last few days the Spanish Fly caught 2 sails, then 10, then 2, then 14 the next. We heard about the good marlin bite up north and went after them on the fly.....also pulling some hooks in the back of the spread.

We raised a nice blue early, but couldn't get the bite on the fly. Throughout the day, we hooked 3 more marlin on conventional, landing a blue around 300 pounds. Boats on either side managed to get a grand slam, one of them had a black, blue and stripe, but couldn't finish with a Super Slam by catching a sailfish. The other had the sail and a stripe and a blue marlin.

We left early today and came in to do a little hang-gliding with the crew of the Spanish Fly. Of course we heard that it was an awesome afternoon bite. That figures.

I hope to send some pictures when I get a chance.

Day 4: 2 big rooster fish, 3 dolphin (1 over 40 pounds), 3 sierra mackeral, 5 sailfish, 1 blue marlin
